About 10,000 children aged between 11 and 14 have been writing and broadcasting their own news bulletins today as part of the third annual BBC News School Report. A record number of 500 schools across the UK have been involved in the project over the past few months. It's designed to teach teenagers how the news is produced and to encourage them to bring their stories and voices to a wider audience. Our media correspondent Torreon Douglas has been finding out what was involved and hearing some of the output.
